
Emigration to Australia

George followed William to work in the mines of Furness. He married a young widow in 1867. They lived in Dalton and the 1871 Census shows a son Thomas Dennison aged 5 by her first marriage. [Thomas, along with his uncle Thomas, is living with married aunt Elizabeth in 1881]

George is said to have emigrated to Australia after the death of his wife in childbirth. His children were left in the care of Thomas and Sarah and they were meant to join him once he had settled. In the event Sarah would not let them go.

The widowed and remarried Harriet Hoggarth emigrated to the USA with her children and families in 1923.

His granddaughter Leona Trill helped source much of the information on this sheet.



Wesley Casley Rayner was the stepson of Ben and Elizabeth Rayner. Wesley's grandfather was Archelaus Casley from St. Just in Cornwall, aged 67 he was a steel sawyer in the shipyard in 1911.

Wesley was attested for the Royal Artillery on 11th July 1923.

Eric Casley was on the passenger list of SS Nieuw Amsterdam sailing for the USA from Southampton 30th October 1947. He is listed as a cotton operative living in Sutton-in-Craven. (Wool spinner in the 1939 register)

George Wedge was the third son of Edward and Mary Wedge. His father was from Netherton in Worcestershire and working for the Furness Railway Company in 1911. The family are in Detroit, Michigan, at the time of the 1940 census along with Mother-in-Law, Harriet Stainton. They appear to have visited the old country in 1950. Harriet Wedge and the children appeared to have visited Eric Casley Rayner (and his mother) at Sutton-in-Craven in 1937 as this was the address given on the passenger list of the "Duchess of Richmond" returning to Quebec & Montreal.



Emigrated from 4 Settle Street, Barrow-in-Furness via Liverpool, 15th December 1922, on board the White Star Line ship "Cedric" bound for New York, final destination given as USA:

Allan Midwood, labourer, 45.

Emigrated from 4 Settle Street, Barrow-in-Furness via Liverpool, 23rd June 1923, on board the Canadian Pacific Line ship "Montrose" bound for Quebec and Montreal but final destination given as USA:

George Wedge, porter, 24; Harriet Wedge, housewife, 21; Ronald Wedge, child, 2; Moyra Wedge, child, 10 months.

Edith Rayner, housewife, 24; Eric Rayner, infant, 6 months.




